### Reindeer Food Recipe

#### **Recipe**

- 250g dark chocolate chips
- 360g creamy peanut butter
- 150g Shreddies cereal
- 120g mini pretzels
- · 230g icing sugar
- 255g red and green M&Ms
- 170g mini peanut butter cups

#### **Instructions**

- In a large bowl, combine Shreddies cereal and the pretzel pieces.
- Melt peanut butter and chocolate together, either on the hob or in the microwave.
- Pour peanut butter chocolate mixture over cereal/ pretzel mixture and stir to combine.
- Chill in the fridge until the mixture just barely begins to set up (about 30 minutes).
- · Remove the mixture from the fridge.
- In a separate large bowl, add 60g of icing sugar and half of the chilled mixture, then add another 60g icing sugar over the cereal and the remaining chocolate/cereal mixture.
- Gently stir until the icing sugar is evenly distributed, tossing to coat the cereal fully. Then chill the mixture again in the fridge until it's set (about another 30-60 minutes).
- Add the rest of the icing sugar, mixing well to coat everything.
- Add the M&Ms and peanut butter cups and stir to combine.
- Transfer to a serving bowl and serve.

# **Salt Dough Christmas**Ornaments

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 cup plain flour
- 1/2 cup salt
- 1/2 cup water (approximately)

#### **Instructions**

Preheat your oven to 90-100°C (200-210°F) for a slow bake. This low temperature prevents the dough from puffing up. In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour and salt. Gradually add water while stirring, until the mixture forms a dough that is firm but pliable. (Tip: If the dough is too dry, add a little more water. If too sticky, sprinkle in a bit more flour). Turn the dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead for about 5 minutes, or until smooth and workable. Use a rolling pin to roll the dough to about 1/4-inch thickness. Avoid making it too thick, as this could affect baking. Use cookie cutters to create festive shapes or shape the dough by hand. Use a straw or skewer to poke a small hole near the top of each shape. Place the shapes on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Bake for 2-3 hours, or until completely dry and hard. Alternatively, you can let the shapes air-dry for 1-2 days. Allow the ornaments to cool completely. Once cool, paint with acrylic paint, and add glitter or other decorations if desired. For a longer-lasting finish, apply a clear varnish or PVA glue after painting. Thread a ribbon or string through each hole to hang the ornament on your tree.

**Tip:** Store your salt dough ornaments in a cool, dry place, and they can be used year after year!

## 1. Fire Safety with Christmas Lights and Decorations
